That's why we're making one million tickets available for under AUD\$100, with child pricing offered at most matches. The invitation is genuine, and it extends to the world.

This is not just a tournament. It is a global party, full of character, connection, and possibility. And you are all welcome.

AUSTRALIA, VIBRANT HOSTS READY TO GO ALL OUT

Men's Rugby World Cup 2027 in Australia marks the dawn of a transformative era for the sport. This 11th edition will be the moment rugby takes a giant leap forward, becoming more inclusive, exciting, and ambitious than ever before.

For six weeks from 1 October-13 November, 2027, Australia will welcome the world to a nationwide festival of rugby, celebrating its rich culture and heritage, and kicking off a new era of rugby that will have a positive impact for Australia, Oceania and the game globally.

With an expanded format contested by the world's top 24 teams over 52 matches, Men's Rugby World Cup 2027 will inspire an entire generation and break down barriers by making rugby even more accessible, relevant and inclusive, boosting rugby's fanbase and participation globally.

This will be the first time that Australia hosts the tournament since 2003. Australia also co-hosted the inaugural tournament with New Zealand in 1987 and were crowned world champions twice in Europe, in 1991 and 1999.

In a nation renowned for hosting some of the world's most iconic sporting events, Men's Rugby World Cup 2027 will carve its own place in history, a spectacular tournament that invites everyone to be part of the action.

All revenue generated by Men's RWC 2027 will be reinvested into the sport, supporting World Rugby's global growth ambition, its 134 member unions and six regional associations.

Rugby World Cup 2027 will take place in seven host cities across Australia, which were selected for their vibrant culture, world-class hospitality and scenic landmarks.



Celebrating First Nations Heritage

Each host city for Men's Rugby World Cup 2027 is recognised by its original name in the language of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as a meaningful acknowledgement of Country and a tribute to the rich cultures, enduring knowledge, and vital contributions of First Nations communities to the story of Australia – past, present and future.



SEVEN HOST CITIES



ADELAIDE TARNTANYA

COMPETITION FORMAT

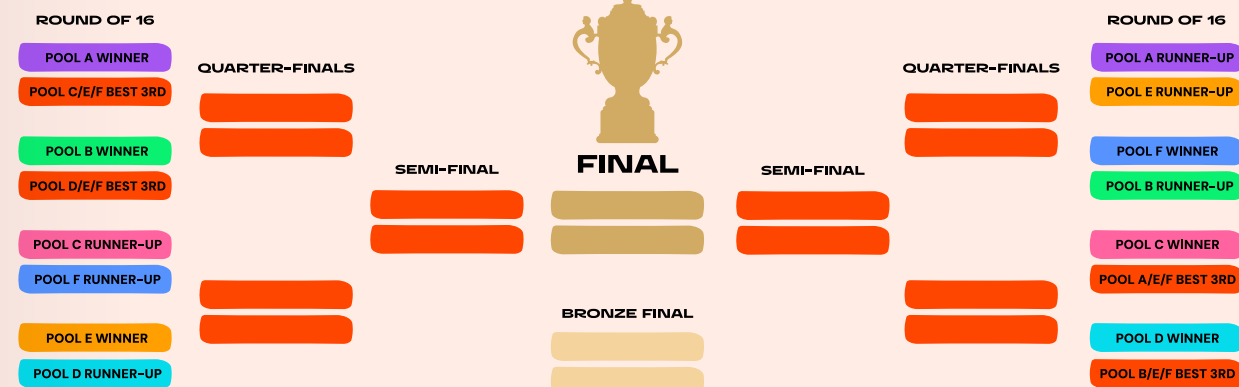
Men's Rugby World Cup 2027 will be the first to feature 24 teams, reflecting rugby's global growth with more nations than ever before competing on the sport's biggest stage in a bid to hold aloft the Webb Ellis Cup in Sydney on 13 November, 2027.

The new expanded format will feature six pools of four teams, replacing the four pools of five teams that had been in place since Australia last hosted the tournament in 2003.

The World Rugby Men's Rankings at the end of the November internationals will be used to create four bands of six teams, with each band drawn randomly into Pool A, B, C, D, E or F.

The exception is Australia who, as hosts, will be placed in Pool A in their respective band.

The top two teams from each pool plus the four best third-placed teams will qualify for the knockout phase, allowing more sides to reach that stage, ensuring every match counts and bringing more entertainment to the competition.



The first-ever Men's Rugby World Cup round of 16 will see the winners of Pool A, B, C and D play the four best thirds, winners of Pool E and F will face the runners-up from Pool D and B, with the runners-up in Pool A and C to meet the second-placed teams from Pool E and F.

While this format does mean an increase in the number of matches from 48 to 52, it doesn't mean more games for the players – a team lifting the Webb Ellis Cup would still play seven matches, just as South Africa did at France 2023.

World Rugby have adopted this reimaged format to ensure maximum jeopardy, drama and excitement for teams and spectators, while importantly not compromising on player welfare with five-day minimum rest periods for teams between games still in place despite the reduction in the tournament duration from seven to six weeks.



A TOURNAMENT FOR ALL

RWC 2027 will be the biggest and most accessible tournament in history with more than 2.5 million tickets available, placing fans firmly at the heart of the process and a programme that embodies a new era of openness and inclusivity to open the sport’s biggest stage to all.

More than one million tickets will be available under AUD\$100 across every stage of the tournament.

Making Australia 2027 as accessible as possible for everyone was a key focus in the planning, be they a lifelong supporter, a family discovering the tournament together or visitors experiencing rugby on Australian soil for the first time.

Ticket prices for adults will start from only AUD\$40 for pool matches and \$65 to watch the Wallabies bid to lift the Webb Ellis Cup for a third time, but first on home soil. More than one million tickets will be available under AUD\$100 across every stage of the tournament.

Families are also at the heart of plans with children’s tickets starting at \$20 and available for all matches bar the semi-finals and final, encouraging families to enjoy world-class rugby in an unforgettable setting, creating lasting memories together.

Fans will have two initial opportunities to secure tickets for the 11th edition of Men’s Rugby World Cup following today’s Draw and the announcement of the match schedule in February 2026.

The first is an exclusive presale, starting on 18 February, restricted to fans who have registered and created their ticketing account before 17 February, 2026. All matches and price categories will be available during the presale and fans are encouraged to register to give themselves the best chance to secure tickets.

Then, in May 2026, a three-week general application phase will open to all supporters worldwide, offering the chance to request tickets for any match. A ballot system will be implemented for oversubscribed price categories to ensure fairness.

A UNIQUE IDENTITY

Men's Rugby World Cup 2027 will be a tournament like no other.

The first to feature 24 teams, 52 matches and a round of 16 required a unique identity that engages fans around the world and embodies Australia as a country of light and energy, reflecting the spirit of its people while celebrating its rich heritage and the diverse social and cultural fabric of the country.

The logo itself draws inspiration from Australia's natural beauty, with a vibrant orange hue evoking the warmth of its sun and distinctive earth. The lines take cues from the coastlines, layered rock formations and winding rivers, seamlessly flowing with energy and converging around the Rugby World Cup ball at its core.

The tapestry subtly woven into the visual identity was created by an artist of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander heritage, specialising in contemporary Indigenous art. The design takes inspiration from various First Nations artistic styles and textures across the country, symbolising Australia's land, sea and sky – three elements of spiritual significance in First Nations cultures. Together, the components symbolise the diverse geography of Australia, reflecting a nation united as a whole.



We Are 27 Creative indigenous artist and designer of the tapestry, Riki Salam said: "With permission, cultural knowledge and deep respect, our goal was to represent the diverse Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islands cultures from across Australia in a contemporary design.

I'm truly impressed with the outcome and how seamlessly my work integrates into the Rugby World Cup 2027 visual identity, while also contributing to greater global awareness of Indigenous peoples and cultures."

JOURNEY TO AUSTRALIA 2027

Samoa became the 24th and final team to qualify for Men's Rugby World Cup 2027 after a nail-biting 13-13 draw with Belgium saw them win the Final Qualification Tournament last month. Both teams went unbeaten through the tournament but a draw was enough for Samoa to deny Belgium a first-ever Rugby World Cup and ensure a 10th consecutive appearance of their own on the sport's biggest stage.

The Journey to Australia 2027 had actually begun at RWC 2023 when 12 nations confirmed their place via a top-three finish in their pools: Argentina, Australia, England, Fiji, France, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Scotland, Wales, runners-up New Zealand and champions South Africa.

That left 12 places to be filled by a regional qualification process, which began in 2024 with preliminary rounds in Africa, Asia and South America but truly ramped up when Europe delivered the first four qualifiers in February.

Over the next nine months, eight other teams would join Georgia, Portugal, Romania and Spain on the plane to Australia for RWC 2027, among them first-time qualifiers Hong Kong China and Zimbabwe, who last contested a Rugby World Cup in 1991.

AFRICA

Eight teams converged on Kampala for the Rugby Africa Men's Cup 2025 in July with the Webb Ellis Cup in attendance on an opening day that saw defending champions Zimbabwe, Algeria, Namibia and Kenya progress to the semi-finals.

Zimbabwe and Namibia would go on to contest the final, ensuring there would be no first-time qualifier from Africa at RWC 2027. A tense decider went right down to the wire after Namibia fought back in the final 20 minutes, only to miss a long-range penalty late on to win the match.

While Zimbabwe could celebrate a return to the Rugby World Cup stage, Namibia had to negotiate a play-off against Asia runners-up the United Arab Emirates to reach the Final Qualification Tournament. They did so with ease, running out 86-29 winners.





ASIA

With Japan qualifying directly via their RWC 2023 performance, Asia would have two teams at a Men's Rugby World Cup for the first time with Hong Kong China strong favourites to create history by winning the Asia Rugby Emirates Men's Championship 2025 title.

To do so, they would have to beat Korea, Sri Lanka and UAE to retain their title, which they duly did in impressive fashion, scoring 191 points and conceding only 39 in three matches.

EUROPE

The eight-team Rugby Europe Men's Championship 2025 would deliver four qualifiers, the identity of whom was confirmed as defending champions Georgia, Portugal, Romania and Spain each won their opening two matches to confirm their places in the semi-finals.

Georgia would retain the title for an eighth consecutive year after beating Spain 46-28 in the final in March, but Los Leones still had plenty to celebrate having qualified for a first Men's Rugby World Cup this century, having made their debut in 1999.

Belgium also ended their campaign on a high, beating the Netherlands 31-10 to finish fifth and confirm their place in the Final Qualification Tournament which would deliver the 24th and last team for RWC 2027.

PACIFIC

The Asahi Super Dry Pacific Nations Cup provided three qualifiers with Canada, Samoa, Tonga and USA bidding to join the already qualified Fiji and Japan at Australia 2027. Tonga and Canada were first to secure their places by reaching the semi-finals, wins over Samoa and USA respectively in the pool phase proving decisive.

That left USA and Samoa to fight it out for the one remaining place in the fifth-place play-off. Samoa had moved 13-8 ahead just past the hour mark but the Men's Eagles responded with three late tries to book their ticket to Australia after missing out on France 2023.

SOUTH AMERICA

Uruguay and Chile reached the Sudamericano 2025 final after beating Paraguay and Brazil in their two-legged semi-finals, setting the long-time rivals against each other with the ultimate prize of a place at RWC 2027 on the line. Uruguay took a 12-point lead into the second leg at home in Montevideo, which proved to be enough to qualify despite going down 21-18 to Chile.

That left Brazil and Paraguay to meet in a play-off for third place and a spot in the Final Qualification Tournament. Brazil had emphatically won their last meeting in 2024, but Paraguay won both legs this time around. However, Paraguay would withdraw after discovering they fielded an ineligible player, sending Brazil to Dubai instead.

SOUTH AMERICA/ PACIFIC PLAY-OFF

Samoa's loss to USA pitted them into a South America/Pacific play-off against Chile, the Sudamericano 2025 runners-up, in September. Samoa fought back from 17 points down at half-time to secure a 32-32 draw in the first leg but, roared on by a crowd of 20,000 in Viña del Mar a week later, Chile ran out 31-12 winners to become the 23rd qualifier for RWC 2027.

FINAL QUALIFICATION TOURNAMENT

Belgium, Brazil, Namibia and Samoa converged on Dubai in November for a round-robin tournament to determine the final team bound for Australia 2027. Top seeds Samoa overcame Brazil and Namibia to set up the decider with Belgium, who had needed a last-gasp winning try to see off the brave Brazilians in round two.

Samoa's two bonus-point wins to Belgium's one meant a draw was enough for the Pacific Islanders, a result they ultimately got after an enthralling contest which saw Belgium captain Jean-Maurice Decubber tie the scores with five minutes to go. His side had to score again to realise their dream of RWC 2027 qualification, Samoa though held firm to break Belgian hearts.



THE DRAW

The Men's Rugby World Cup 2027 Draw takes place in Sydney on Wednesday, 3 December. It will be broadcast on Stan Sport, 9Gem and 9Now in Australia, but will also be available everywhere on the planet via RugbyPass TV and World Rugby YouTube.

World Rugby Chair Brett Robinson, All Blacks legend and two-time Rugby World Cup winner Dan Carter, Australia's most-capped player James Slipper and Rio 2016 Olympic gold medallist Alicia Lucas are the presenters for the draw.



Draw format

Men's Rugby World Cup 2027 takes place from 1 October-13 November, 2027 and for the first time will feature an expanded 24 teams, who will be allocated into six pools of four teams.

A first in the modern era, all teams are confirmed ahead of the draw with Samoa becoming the 24th and final national side to book their ticket to Australia after winning the Final Qualification Tournament in Dubai last month.

The World Rugby Men's Rankings as of 1 December, 2025 have been used to place the 24 teams into four bands of six for the draw (see bands on the right).

The teams will then be randomly drawn by band, starting with Band 4, so that each pool has one team from each of the four bands. The exception to this will be Australia, who will be placed in Pool A in their relevant band and will play in the opening match in Perth | Boorloo on 1 October, 2027.

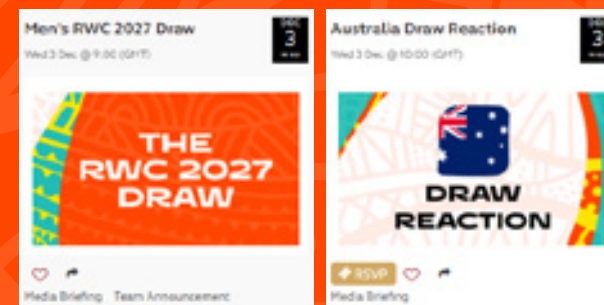

INTERESTING STATISTICS

- > Australia were the first nation to lift the Webb Ellis Cup twice after successes in 1991 and 1999. They only conceded one try in winning their second title.
- > The Wallabies have lost their two finals since, to England on home soil in 2003 and New Zealand in 2015.
- > Australia hold the record for the biggest margin in a pool match, having beaten Namibia 142-0 at RWC 2003.

PAST POOL STATISTICS

- > The Wallabies lost two pool matches at RWC 2023, only one fewer than in the previous nine tournaments combined.
- > This meant that Australia failed to reach the knockout stage for the first time.
- > Australia have never been drawn in a pool with France, New Zealand, Portugal, Scotland, Spain or Tonga
- > They have never played against Chile, Hong Kong China or Zimbabwe.
- > Wales are Australia's most common pool opponents with five meetings, including the last three tournaments.
- > They have also faced Fiji at the last three tournaments.
- > Australia have not faced Argentina in a pool since they hosted RWC 2003.

- > Spain are yet to score a try on the Rugby World Cup stage.
- > This will be Spain's first Rugby World Cup this century after booking their place via the Rugby Europe Men's Championship 2025.
- > Ukrainian-born playmaker Andrey Kovalenco kicked all of Spain's points in a 27-15 loss to Uruguay on their RWC debut in 1999.

PAST POOL STATISTICS

- > Spain faced Scotland, South Africa and Uruguay in their only previous Rugby World Cup in 1999.
- > They have never played against Australia, England, France, Ireland, Italy, New Zealand or Wales – but lost to the A teams of England and Ireland in November.

TONGA

INTERESTING STATISTICS

- > Tonga are the only one of the three Pacific Island nations to have contested a Rugby World Cup not to reach the knockout stage.
- > Their biggest scalp at a Rugby World Cup was a 19-14 win over France in 2011, Kurt Morath kicking 14 of Tonga's points.
- > Tonga last failed to win a match in a tournament in 2003 – only the second time in nine tournaments they have returned home winless after 1987.

PAST POOL STATISTICS

- > Tonga's most-common pool opponent are New Zealand with four, spread across five tournaments from 1999-2015.
- > They have never met Chile, Fiji, Hong Kong China, Spain or Uruguay at a Rugby World Cup.
- > Tonga have not played a test match against Australia, Portugal or Zimbabwe.
- > The 'Ikale Tahi have not been in a pool with Wales since the inaugural tournament in 1987.

URUGUAY

INTERESTING STATISTICS

- > Uruguay have qualified for a fourth consecutive Rugby World Cup as Sudamericano 2025 champions.
- > Los Teros coach Rodolfo Ambrosio will head to a Rugby World Cup with a third team, having played for Italy in the first-ever RWC match in 1987 and been Chile's attack coach in 2023.
- > The Ormaechea name is synonymous with Uruguay's RWC journey, Diego captaining Los Teros in their first tournament in 1999 before his sons Juan and Agustín also graced the RWC stage.
- > Diego scored Uruguay's first-ever RWC try and is also the oldest player in the tournament's history at 40 years and 26 days.

PAST POOL STATISTICS

- > Uruguay have never been drawn in a pool with Argentina, Canada, Chile, Hong Kong China, Japan, Portugal, Romania, Tonga or USA.
- > They are yet to face Ireland or Zimbabwe in a test match.
- > Uruguay have faced four teams on two occasions at a Rugby World Cup in Australia, Fiji, South Africa and Wales.
- > Los Teros met France, Italy, Namibia and New Zealand at RWC 2023, the first time they had faced them on the RWC stage.

ZIMBABWE

INTERESTING STATISTICS

- > Zimbabwe return to the Rugby World Cup stage for the first time in 36 years, having been the first side to represent Africa in 1987 and 1991.
- > They have not faced one of the other 23 qualifiers in a test since meeting Hong Kong China in November 2016.
- > Zimbabwe are still seeking a first Rugby World Cup victory, the closest they have come being a 21-20 loss to Romania in their first match in 1987.
- > They have conceded 50 points or more in every RWC match bar that narrow defeat.

PAST POOL STATISTICS

- > Zimbabwe have faced one team twice on the Rugby World Cup stage in Scotland.
- > The other sides they played in their appearances in 1987 and 1991 are France, Ireland, Japan and Romania.
- > Zimbabwe have never met Argentina, Australia, Canada, Chile, England, Fiji, Georgia, New Zealand, Samoa, South Africa, Uruguay or USA in a test.
- > They have faced Italy but the Azzurri didn't award caps for the 1993 match.
